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WORKSHOPS & Conference Presentations

Workshop I (Monday October 8th, 9-noon)

Implementing UAS Technology into Operations at Transportation Organizations

Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) technology are revolutionizing many types of DOT operations, from inspecting bridges to mapping rights-of-way. Effective use of UAS technology goes far beyond buying and flying a drone. This disruptive technology can challenge organizations in multiple ways. The expansive volumes of data that drones can acquire can tax IT infrastructure, personnel must have the requisite GIS and CAD skills to make use of many of the data products, and regulatory hurdles can slow implementation. Despite all the promising of revolutionizing operations, DOTs may find that implementing UAS technology actually costs them more money in the short term. This workshop, led by the <u>University of Vermont UAS Team</u> will draw on the experiences of implementing UAS technology into three state DOTs. Participants will gain an in-depth understanding of not only UAS platforms and sensors, but the associated data processing, data management, human resource, and organizational implications of adopting UAS technology.

Jarlath O'Neil-Dunne is the Director of the University of Vermont's (UVM) Spatial Analysis Laboratory (SAL). His work focuses on extracting meaningful information from remotely sensed data to help managers make more informed decisions. Jarlath leads the University of Vermont Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) team, which has carried out over 500 missions in support of various transportation, natural resource, and disaster response projects over the past 6 years.

Workshop II (Thursday, October 11, 9-noon)

Innovative Solutions to Transportation Training Challenges

iCube, a center at <u>Tennessee Tech University</u>, utilizes virtual reality, marketing, public policy campaigns, and app development to create innovative solutions for traditional problems. In a close partnership with Tennessee DOT (TDOT), *iCube* is currently taking TDOT training materials across multiple departments and combining them into a digital, unified system. This systems approach will be previewed in the presentation, and *iCube* will showcase other projects created for clients in the traffic safety realm. The workshop will generate ideas, projects, and products that *iCube* resources (training, virtual reality, and marketing campaigns) can be used to demonstrate new approaches to solving problems, relevant to any Department of Transportation in the country, based on the experience in working with TDOT. Lyndsay Botts

Deputy Commissioner/Chief of Staff Tennessee Department of Transportation

Lyndsay Botts is the Deputy Commissioner and Chief of Staff for the Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT). Lyndsay joined TDOT in 2011 as the Director of the Communications Division and then was selected by Commissioner John Schroer as his Chief of Staff, where she serves as the Commissioner's senior advisor and strategist, working to coordinate and execute his strategic vision for the Department. Lyndsay directs the TDOT legislative team and works with the

General Assembly and other stakeholders to promote the Department's policy positions and to meet the Administration's legislative goals. She also leads the strategic development of internal and external communications and overall messaging for the Department. Lyndsay's has a strong national network through her involvement with AASHTO (Commissioner Schroer is the current AASHTO president), and has built an effective network of professional relationships throughout Tennessee, developed in part by regularly travelling to all 95 counties with the TDOT senior leadership team in an effort to strengthen the department's partnerships with communities. She is a 2018 graduate of *Leadership Tennessee*, a program comprised of proven leaders from across the state that focus on collaborating to effectively address complex issues facing Tennessee. Before joining TDOT, Lyndsay worked for U.S. Senator Lamar Alexander for eight years, serving as his Field Director for southeast Tennessee and Statewide Press Assistant. Lyndsay graduated from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, where she earned a B.S. in Communications.

& Joseph Galbato III

Deputy Commissioner/Chief Financial Officer Tennessee Department of Transportation

Joseph Galbato III is the Deputy Commissioner and Chief Financial Officer of the Tennessee Department of Transportation. Joe joined TDOT in October of 2011 as the first CFO in the department's history. His primary focus is to ensure TDOT is managed efficiently and with financial integrity.



Joe is also the Chief of the Administrative Bureau which oversees Central Services, Finance, Human Resources, Information Technology, Civil Rights, Strategic Planning, Internal Audit, and the Governor's Highway Safety Office. Joe works with fellow Bureau Chiefs to manage an annual budget of 2 billion dollars of transportation projects as well as internal department spending. He plays a vital role in maintaining TDOT's status as one of five debt free transportation departments in the US. In an effort to make TDOT stronger financially to deal with federal uncertainty, Joe has strengthened financial control regarding cost overruns to put the department in a very favorable cash position. He has also spearheaded a cash forecasting discipline to safeguard TDOT's assets. On a national level, Joe is an active member of AASHTO (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials). He serves on the following 3 committees: Funding/Finance, Administration, and Transportation Policy. Prior to joining TDOT, Joe was the Chief Financial Officer for several Nashville area companies including Alive Hospice, HCCA International and Envoy/WebMD.

Dr. Mina Sartipi

University of Tennessee Chattanooga Urban Science and Technology, SimCenter, & Center for Urban Informatics and Progress (CUIP)

Dr. Mina Sartipi is a UC Foundation Professor at the Department of Computer Science and Engineering at the University of Tennessee Chattanooga. She is also the director of the Center for Urban



Informatics and Progress (CUIP), where she engages experts from across the statewide UT system in cross-disciplinary research into solutions to urban challenges. Dr. Sartipi Joined UTC in 2006 following conferral of the PHD in Electrical Engineering from Georgia Tech. Her research interests are on smart applications and intelligent systems to tackle the real-world challenges in mobility, energy, and healthcare. Her research is funded by NSF, NIH, THEC, and industry. Dr. Sartipi was awarded the IEEE Senior membership in 2016. She has a number of invited papers, journal papers, and professional conference presentations. In her spare time, she enjoys traveling and outdoor activities including hiking and rock climbing with her family.
